THE WORLD'S BLIND SPOT: THE SILENCED GENOCIDE

In the unfolding events of present-day Israel, accusations of committing acts of "genocide" against the Palestinians have come to the forefront. This decades-long dispute has seen numerous outbreaks of violence and each time, the world watches with bated breath as civilians on both sides suffer. The trajectory and intensity of the Israeli ground invasion and bombing of Gaza align with the umbrella of core crimes under the Rome Statute of the International Criminal Court.[1]

As the world watches, innocent civilians, including children, are losing their lives, homes, and very futures at the hands of a military power that seems intent on erasing their presence from the world. It is not just an attack; it is a genocide. While the term "genocide" is highly charged and controversial, it is essential to examine the situation from this perspective to highlight the alarming pattern of violence and suffering that persists.

Genocide is one of the most horrific crimes against humanity. It is the deliberate killing of a large group of people, especially those of a particular ethnic group or nation. This heinous act is motivated by hatred and bigotry. The most well-known example of genocide is the Holocaust, in which Nazi Germany slaughtered six million Jews during World War II.[2] Other examples of genocide include the Rwandan genocide of 1994, in which over 800,000 Tutsis were killed by Hutu extremists, and the Darfur genocide in Sudan, in which over 200,000 Darfuris were killed by government forces and militias.[3] [4]

As per data, since October 7, 2023, Israel has escalated its sixteen-year closure over 2.2 Palestinians in million Gaza. where approximately half the population is under eighteen years of age, indiscriminately and repeatedly bombing civilians while cutting off access to all necessities, including food, water, electricity, and medical supplies.[5] This paints a distressing picture of the situation Gaza. The that in fact half of this population approximately children highlights comprises the vulnerability of the affected demographics. In times of such dire

The humanitarian crisis on October 13, 2023, witnessed a forced "evacuation" of 1.1 million Palestinians out of northern Gaza, exacerbating the rising ethical and human rights concerns[6].

Israeli forces have become unstoppable. Since the Knesset blared the war conch with Israeli Prime Minister Netanyahu declaring war, massive bloodshed and massacres have been witnessed. Around 6,000 bombs have been reportedly dropped on Gaza, killing over 4000 people, as no such mass murders can be kept to a count.[7] Even though Israel's right to self-defense against armed attack according to Article 51 of the Charter of the United Nations is indisputable, it is still restricted by international humanitarian law.[8] It explains that in the room of self-defense, there is a shelf for differentiation. The warring parties must differentiate between civilians and combatants, between civilian objects and military targets. The people of Gaza are trapped in an open-air prison, subjected to a merciless blockade, and then subjected to merciless bombings. Moreover, Article 6(c) of the Rome Statute explicitly states, "Deliberately inflicting on the group conditions of life calculated to bring about its physical destruction in whole or in part" as a material element of the crime of genocide, which is proportional to starving out a civilian population as is being witnessed, clearly violating international law.

To top it all, the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) estimated that there are 5,40,000 women of reproductive age in Gaza, among whom 50,000 are currently pregnant and 5,522 are expected to deliver in the next month. These numbers paint a horrific picture of "imposing measures intended to prevent births within the group".[9] These are signs of blatant violations of international law. In the absence of a ceasefire, these numbers will only keep growing. Today, in the most contentious conflict of our time, there is a total siege over Gaza. human rights organization Israeli B'Tselem has accused Israel of "war crimes", calling it "a criminal policy of revenge".

Another press statement was by Jan Egeland, the incumbent Secretary-General of the Norwegian Refugee Council, stressing the Israeli military demand for relocation as a "forcible transfer of populations" in disguise. If such an "evacuation" drill is carried forward, it is correctly to be placed under Genocide (Article 6(e)). Genocide is a crime against humanity that must never be tolerated. The situation urgently demands international attention and intervention. Humanitarian organizations, governments, and global communities must work towards finding a peaceful resolution and ensuring the well-being and safety of the affected Palestinian population. The United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) adopted a resolution titled "Protection of Civilians and Upholding Legal and Humanitarian Obligations" on October 27, 2023.[11]

This resolution calls for an "immediate, durable, and sustainable humanitarian truce" between Israeli forces and Hamas militants in Gaza. With 120 votes in favor, 14 against, and 45 abstentions, genocide is surely a preventable crime waiting for a solution. [12]

On the other side of the coin, several contradictions and violations are being witnessed too; one such is paving Canada's path to the news. 13 Despite Canada's approach to the current chaos by lending humanitarian aid, Prime Minister Justin Trudeau's "insensitive" son shared his son's beheaded costume on social media platforms. It drew backlash to his idea of "humanitarian pauses on hostilities". We all thus have a responsibility to prevent genocide and protect victims, and by working together, we can create a world where genocide is never again tolerated.

As the world debates what the future holds, the specter of World War III looms ominously, underscoring the urgency of resolving this crisis. [1] Rome Statute Of The International Criminal Court, art. 6

[Fatima grabs hold of her table, and looks around for the phone which fell]

Tenali Rama: (removes the bucket from his head and runs his hand over his head and says) Naa peru Tenali Ramakrishna, nannu vikata kavi ani kuda gurthistaru.

Shakespeare: (nods at first, but looks very confused, turns towards the audience and says) "What did he just say?"

Tenali Rama (immediately says) :hatha vidhii

(*He lets out a deep breath and walks up to Shakespeare and offers his hand while saying*)

Tenali: "Well met, Mr. Shakespeare, I am Tenali Ramakrishna, I was one of the Ashtadiggajas (or the eight honorable poets) at the court of King Krishnadevaraya." Before Shakespeare reacts, we see Fatima stand up and pinch herself a couple of times, before running around shouting

Fatima: (shouting, panicking, and throwing their arms around) "Oh god, did I die while reading for my language exam?" (x2)

[Shakespeare and Tenali Rama both look intently at each other and the audience for a while, both simultaneously let out a sigh while holding their heads and getting back to their conversation]

(while they are having a conversation the student is still panicking and running around)

Shakespeare: As I was about to say, it is a pleasure to meet you, good sir. You mentioned being an Ashtadiggaja, which means you must have been a great poet. Not to be boasting about myself, but I too am endearingly referred to as the bard.

(While Tenali says the next few lines, Fatima stops in one place and intently tries to overhear the conversation)

Tenali: Yes, yes I've heard of your poems, everyone who has ever tried to sound intellectual has. You should see the teenage boys of today's age, when they are supposed to read your poems for an exam, they find *ahem* very creative ways to solve their problem, but the minute they see a gi-

Fatima: (Walks up to Shakespeare from behind and tries to take a selfie) [shakespeare shrieks and jumps to Tenali)

Fatima: Sir! Please! Help me! I have an exam for you! What do your poems even mean? Why do I have to understand what your mood was when you were writing your plays? Why did you even write them?! [has to sound very agitated]

Shakespeare Jumps up immediately (around the selfie) and runs behind Tenali Rama with a shriek.

Shakespeare: (responds after the student asks their question) What, quite unmanned in folly? (Slowly stops looking at the student and looks directly at the audience) Thou reap what thou sou, lazy brute. Oh dear god, for what hath I hoist mine own petard!! For what earthly reason didst I hast to attain such fame? a whole generation of children loathes this humble poet for his work. (distractedly looks towards Tenali) Why might not but I suffer from such success.

Tenali: (starts laughing uncontrollably when Shakespeare utters the word humble)

(Fatima: checking her phone)

Tenali: (Once Shakespeare is done with the monologue): Aghorinchav le gani inko maata anuko!

Fatima: Sir, there seems to be a mistake, I seek not thy help, I merely seek thy words. "I seek thy answer Oh Humble bard, If they feed nothing else they shall feed my revenge. Your words have hindered me in my perfect grade, laughed at my marks by my peers, and mocked

at my answers what's the reason? I am a student. Hath not a student dignity? Hath not a student senses, affections, passions? Fed with the same food, hurt with the same weapons, subject to the same diseases, healed by the same means, warmed and cooled by the same winter and summer, as bard?"

(choking voice) (at the top of their voice)

If you prick us, do we not bleed?

Shakespeare runs to the student as soon as he mentions Bard and holds the student momentarily, but Tenali taps him on the shoulder, Shakespeare turns to Tenali and pats him (tenali) back on the shoulder

Tenali: Your talent for drama far surpasses that of my friend here, too bad you don't know a word of what you just said.

Fatima : Adenti Sir antha maata annaru?

Tenali : Nuvvu ippudu cheppindi antha nee pusthakam lo raasi undhi ani naaku telusu, nuvu cheppina danilo okka mukka aina neeku ardham ayyinda?

Did you understand a single word of the monologue you just gave? I know all of that is taken directly from that book of yours.

THE STUDENT

ARTICLE

Fatima: antey... adi... (scratches his head and hesitantly says) Your words have disgraced me antey naku ardham kaledu. I'll tell you what I understood. (gestures being stabbed) If you prick us do we not bleed antey mammalni podi-

Tenali : Aappu, vignana pradarsanalu oddu. Please stop!

Shakespeare: Why did you stop her? I want to know what he had to say. I want to know the effect of my words on this young mind.

Tenali: Your words did not affect that (points towards the student) mind! This student is merely memorizing the interpretations of your words written by someone else!

Shakespeare: Is it! But she seemed to be answering just fine until you stopped her. What a student needs is an affectionate ear, not a firm hand that asks questions without expecting answers

Tenali: A firm hand is needed with this kind, they care neither for the efforts we put into writing, nor for the words they so casually take for granted. [Shakespeare and Tenali continue arguing (muted)]

[Insert pink panther theme here]

Fatima: slowly walks up to the audience while acting in a sneaky way to go unnoticed by the bickering men, Looks at the audience

Fatima: Wow! I'm currently watching Shakespeare argue with Tenali Rama of all people, it's like that time Scooby-Doo and Batman had a crossover. The point is, this night cannot possibly

get any weirder.

(While the student says this, we see two women enter the stage, a middle-aged woman accompanying an old lady.) (song: Mahadevi verma [Madhur Madhur mere deepak jal aasha bhosle])

Fatima: Of course! Just who was missing, my teacher. I jinxed myself! It did get weirder. Fatima immediately covers her face and tries to run away, but is unable to leave, (the student is seen running in place, struggling) The teacher notices the student trying to leave and calls the student out

Teacher: Hey Fatima! Where are you going?! Don't you know to wish your teachers when you see them? No manners only madam this generation (looks towards the audience while saying this) (acts in a very disappointed manner)

Fatima : (To the audience, all others pause) Great another nightmare I can't run away from

Fatima : (lets out a sigh and walks towards their teacher). No ma'am, I was just trying to get my textbook (laughs dryly). I wanted to ask some doubts mam. We have an exam tomorrow Na...

Teacher: I know what you were doing. Basic responsibility and dignity your generation doesn't have. We have to remind you to greet us and come in proper uniform and be at the back of you to ask doubts. *Clicks her tongue* (Looks at Mahadevi Verma and the audience)

Sapnon mai bhi shanti se rehne nahi dete hain ye log!

Fatima : (points her hands to herself) (In English) Mam me mam!?

Teacher: What doubt do you have?

Fatima: Mam is this topic important?

(shows their book to the teacher)

We have so much portion mam, do we have to read this poem as well? Bujhi deepak jala loon....

Teacher: (gives a stern look to the student, clears her throat dramatically, and says): Of course it is important, everything in your textbook is important. I don't know where you people

get this culture of expecting important questions right before the exam even though you sit with blank expressions the whole year. Please at least behave properly when you are in the presence of great minds such as Shakespeare, Tenali Ramakrishna, and Mahadevi Verma. Fatima :(looking embarrassed) Sorry mam.

[Notices Mahadevi Verma]

Fatima: oh. Ohhh. (Looking at Mahadevi Varma) Sorry ma'am, I failed to take notice of your

presence, I was too involved in preparing for my tests.

(sheepishly trying to cover up the embarrassment)...um, Mam, I enjoy your poems a lot, can you explain-

Teacher: (expression of embarrassment because of the student, facepalm) I am extremely sorry mam, I have failed to discipline my student.

(Fatima discretely trying to compare Mahadevi Verma with her phone: Looks towards the audience and says: Okay Boggle, who is Mahadevi Verma?)

Mahadevi Verma: That's okay, par yeh batao, why are you reading the poems without being able to enjoy or trying to understand them?

Fatima : (looks nervously towards their teacher) Mam, when I have subjects such as social studies or science, I rarely have the time to concentrate on subjects that are of lesser importance to everyone else.

(Shakespeare and Tenali Rama both stop quarreling, nod to each other, and shake hands the moment the Student says they rarely have time)

THE STUDENT

Mahadevi Verma: (laughs dryly) Yes beta, I understand that sometimes as a student you have to prioritize while studying. You'd have to give more importance, merely running through a poem will give you nothing but boredom. Sahitya ki sundarta aur kathinayi (किठनाई) isi baat mai hai. Such is the beauty and the difficulty of literature.

(Shakespeare and Tenali Rama both join the conversation) Shakespeare: Thank you, Mrs. Verma, I was about to say the same.

(Tenali gets baffled the moment Shakespeare takes her name.) Tenali: Her you've heard of!?

Shakespeare: Don't be silly, I've heard of both of you. I only pretended to not know you.

Tenali : Why!?

Shakespeare: eh. What's life without a laugh or two? (Starts laughing) (Tenali facepalm)

Shakespeare: Anyways, back to the point (looks towards the student). You mentioned not having enough time for poetry or literature. But that is simply foolish. To borrow from the great Robin Williams: "We read and write poetry because we are members of the human race, and the human race is filled with passion. Medicine, law, business, and engineering, are noble pursuits and are necessary to sustain life. But poetry, beauty, love, these are what we stay alive for." Mahadevi Verma: who knew, Shakespeare, the King's Playwright, is a cinephile. That's just Poetic.

(Shakespeare smiles)

Mahadevi Verma: Your hours of studying will be of no use to you if you don't find a way to use any of that to enjoy your life, to make someone else's life better. You could spend the rest of your student life memorizing everything in every book you find, or read because you want to learn, read to have fun, read to help yourself and hopefully the people around you. Tenali Rama: (lets out a sigh) Your ability to read, write, and understand in any language. That is literacy. But your ability to appreciate literature goes beyond that. Any person, who can simply understand the words can appreciate the beauty of those words. [All the characters except Fatima scramble off the stage, and Fatima goes back to her bench]

Narrator: Everything about to happen from here on is real

Fatima : (stretches arms lazily) ammaa....What a weird dream. (Lets out a deep sigh)I only have 4 more hours to my exam, and I haven't even completed one round of reading.I'm gonna fail. (yawns)Oh well, 5 more minutes and I'll get back to it.

(Fatima goes back to sleep)

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
